Summary of Cyclonic Storm "AILA"

Current Situation

The death toll due to the cyclone AILA reached 190. Many areas of the affected districts were inundated and houses, roads and embankments were damaged. Relief efforts are continuing in all affected districts with some early recovery underway. Restoring water supplies in these areas remains a priority. As of June 08, 2009 total 19675 MT GR Rice, BDT 3,72,88,000 as GR Cash and BDT 17,57,92,000 as house building grant have been allocated along with BDT 60,60,000 BDT for relief transportation.

The WASH cluster/ working group is doing assessment for further assistance regarding water and sanitation. A rough estimate indicates about 500,000 to 750,000 people are seeking immediate water supply and sanitation supports. Most of the ponds have saline water contamination making them unfit to support drinking and other domestic water supply for the communities. Water purification is carried out by agencies such as CARE/Oxfam GB, DPHE, Save the Children USA, WVI. Bangladesh Army is also supporting water trucking to the locations those are difficult to reach by other agencies. Beside providing pure water many WASH working group agencies are working on restoration of potable water sources by dewatering/disinfecting ponds and tube-wells.

WASH cluster is facilitating by connecting the agencies with complementary capacities to deliver life-saving services to affected location. Moreover the working group is producing/sharing information regarding "who is doing what and where" and this matrix will be updated with quantity of responses by agencies.

Action Aid at Satkhira:

Action Aid Bangladesh, distributed 500 packagers to Gabura and Padmapukur union under Shamnagar Upazilla, these are the severe effected area through LEDAR., 600 packages to Burigualini and Atulia union under Shamnagar Upazilla through Gono Unnayan Foundation, 300 packages to Protapnagar Union Under Shamnagar Upzila through Asray Foundation, 100 packages for Acid survivors through Swadesh and 100 packages to Padmapukur under Shamnagar Upzila through Protik Trust.

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BRAC

As of 6th June, 2009, BRAC has provided emergency relief in 16 upazilas of Barisal, Bagerhat, Khulna and Sathkira. BRAC has distributed dry food packets consists of Chira (flatted rice), gur, 2L bottled water, ORS sachets to 34,308 families as of Jun 05, 2009. In Shyamnagar upazila under Sathkira district, Koira and Dacope under Khulna district, BRAC is continuing to distribute water directly to the isolated villages by boats. This supply will continue till the situation stabilizes in those areas on a targeted scale. Through this intervention, BRAC has provided safe water supply to 24,807 families in Sathkira, Koira and Dacope by boats. BRAC has dispatched 28 X 1000 liters containers to Sathkira and Khulna for storage of drinking water and after the emergency response has been discontinued, these can be used as Rain Water Harvesters by the communities. About 150,000 ORS sachets have been dispatched to Bagerhat, Sathkira and Khulna to combat the potential diarrhea outbreak. BRAC is distributing food packets consists of 5 kg rice, 1 kg dal -lentil, 0.5 L cooking oil, 0.5 kg salt, 1 kg potato, matches, 4 ORS sachets to 3300 families. The organization is distributing polythene (plastic) sheets for those who have sought refuge on embankments, roads or other high ground. BRAC has distributed 2300 plastic sheets and will be distributing a further 2700 plastic sheets to Khulna and Sathkira. Considering nutrition intake of children in the affected areas during this calamity, BRAC has decided to distribute 1900 children in Khulna, 960 children in Bagerhat and 1000 children in Sathkira with 3 packets of biscuits and 0.5 liter of water from June 06, 2009 onwards. Relief work of BRAC in Shyamnagar and Koira upazilas are being intensified and in Bagerhat BRAC have moved to early recovery activities. The organization dewatered 7 ponds and will be dewatering another 20 ponds which are flooded with saline water. Below is the support of BRAC at a glance as of June 08, 2009:

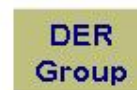

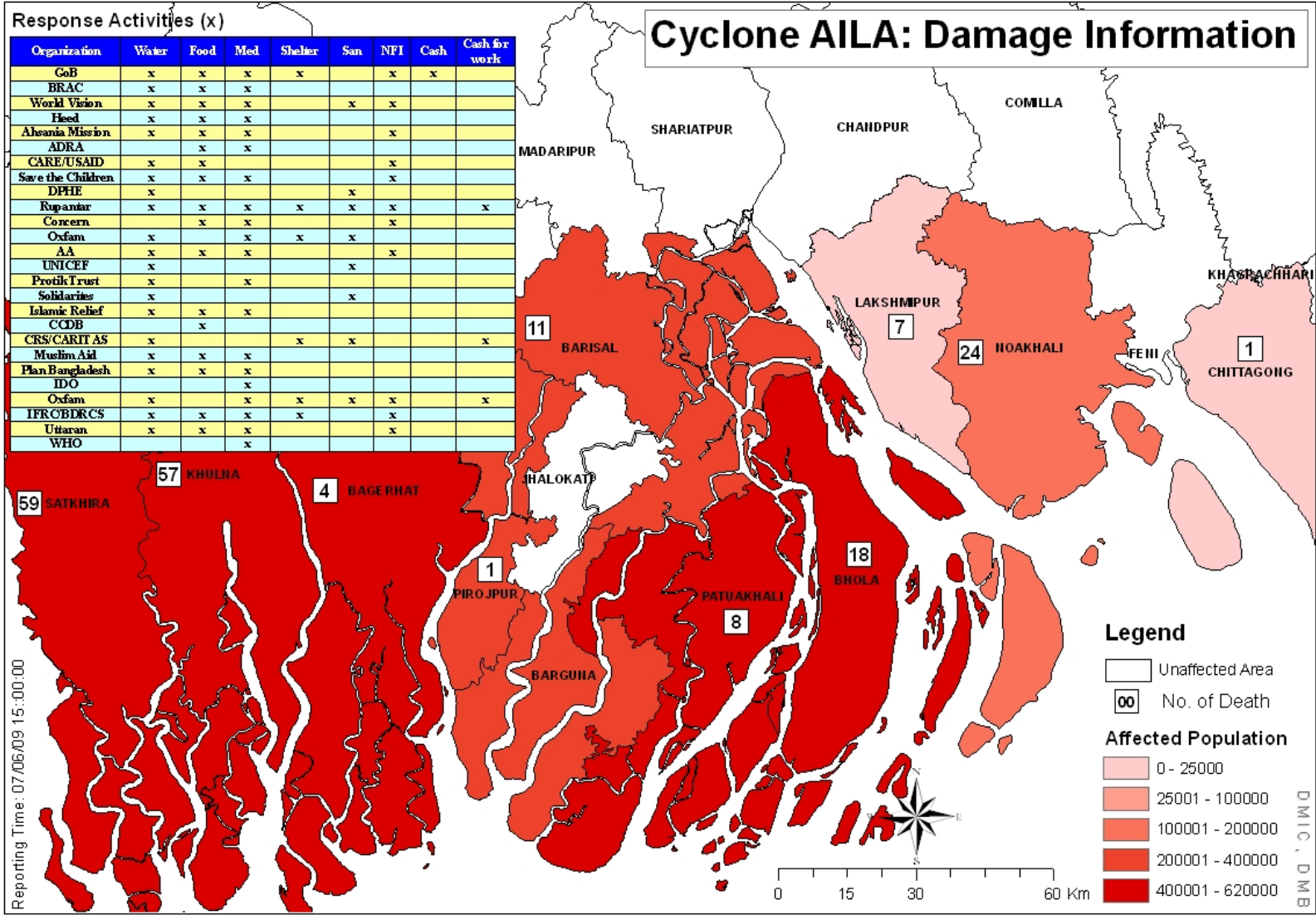

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**Special Situation Report from
WASH Cluster/ Working Group, Bangladesh: Cyclone AILA Response
June 08, 2009-06-09**

Situation Overview:

There are 7 districts that are most significantly affected during cyclone Aila. The districts, Satkira and Khulna, are most affected; and the districts Bagerhat and Barguna are next order significantly affected; in relation to the damage of water supply and sanitation infrastructure. A rough estimate indicates about 500,000 to 750,000 people are seeking immediate water supply and sanitation supports.

DPHE through their initial rapid assessment has identified 8 upazillas namely Asasuni, Syamnagar, Dacope, Koyera, Mongla, Sarankhola, Patherghata and Barguna Sadar, where the damage in water supply and sanitation has been significantly high; and most of these upazillas have unions with drinking-water scarcity.

The present level of assessment indicates damage of about 250,000 latrines, 35,000 public water points, and 5,500 drinking-water source ponds. Most of the ponds have saline water contamination making them unfit to support drinking and other domestic water supply for the communities. This has aggravated the situation of water scarcity; as groundwater is saline and people are dependent on only surface water in normal situation. This high level of saline intrusion was caused by the damage in the embankments during the cyclone.

Major WASH concern over the affected population has been diarrhoea and dysentery. There are also noticeable water-washed diseases such as eye and skin infections. Majority of diarrhoeal incidences are reported from Satkhira and Khulna.

The immediate WASH needs continue to be: safe drinking water; basic sanitation especially for the temporary shelters; WASH non-food items including water-purifying tablets, sanitary napkins and soaps; and life-saving hygiene promotion focusing on hand-wash and use of NFIs. Restoring existing tube wells and latrines are also considered as immediate needs in most of the affected areas.

Summary of Interventions/ with remarks:

Water purification is carried out by agencies such as CARE/Oxfam GB, DPHE, Save the Children USA, WVI and Bangladesh Army; for the supply to the communities in water scarce locations. Although 16 mobile water treatment plants are in use, most of them don't have the capacity to remove salinity. Also the reverse-osmosis technology usually used for the removal of salts; it needs high-level of energy that is difficult to avail in remote district/upazilla locations.

Several agencies such as ActionAid, BRAC, BDRCS, CARE, CARITAS, DAM, DPHE, Muslim Aid, Oxfam GB, Save the Children alliances, NGO Forum alliances, Sushilon and their partners are engaged in water trucking both by road and waterways. Bangladesh Army is also supporting water trucking to the locations; those are difficult to reach by other agencies.

In several affected locations, over 3.5 Million water purifying tablets have been supplied to communities by agencies such as BRAC, Concern WW, DPHE/UNICEF, Muslim Aid, Oxfam GB, Solidarites, FH, NGO Forum, Sushilon and WaterAid. Limitations regarding the use of purifying tablets over in the saline water locations, is communicated to WASH Cluster working group members. This is noted that WPTs are not useful in case the water is turbid;

and also WPT is not helpful in removing salinity. Moreover, there is a clear need for communication over the use of WPTs, while distributing them.

Agencies such as DPHE, Islamic Relief, NGO Forum, Muslim Aid, Oxfam GB, Solidarites and WaterAid are engaged in the repair/rehabilitation and installation of tube-wells. Over 6,000 tube wells are reported to be rehabilitated/ disinfected and 100 new tube-wells are installed. Similarly BRAC, DPHE/UNICEF and WaterAid are working on pond cleaning and guiding communities on the rainwater harvesting in limited scale.

Emergency temporary latrines have been installed by BDRCS/IFRC, DPHE/UNICEF, Islamic Relief, NGO Forum, Oxfam GB, Sushilon, WaterAid and Solidarites. Most of the installations are close to temporary/cyclone shelters and near to the embankments, where most of the displaced people are presently residing.

Some of the WASH cluster partner agencies such as BDRCS/IFRC, Concern WW, BRAC, Islamic Relief, Oxfam GB, Solidarites and FH have supplied a total of about 500,000 sachets of ORS to support diarrhoeal management of affected people.

WASH Cluster Working Group outputs:

The WASH cluster working group has met twice so far at national level; once on 27 May and again on 07 June. These meetings were participated by 15 major WASH agencies. One divisional level meeting has been conducted at Khulna on 02 June. The outputs include the followings:

- WASH Cluster has shared the emergency WASH technology feasibility matrix following the request of cluster/working-group partners in the first meeting. The matrix provides useful information regarding geographical/ hydro-geological and water quality challenges in each union; with the potential emergency WASH response interventions. This has helped agencies to plan/design their response.
- Producing/sharing information regarding who is doing what and where in union levels. This output, supplemented with the bilateral meetings among agencies, has helped promoting joint working among agencies with complementary WASH capacities in most affected unions/upazillas. About 5 to 9 agencies are now active in most affected and hard-to-reach unions, expect in Mongla and Barguna Sadar.
- Facilitated connecting agencies with complementary capacities to deliver life-saving services to affected locations such as making use of about 11,000 empty jerry cans available with BDRCS/IFRC for carrying drinking water; filtered by Oxfam GB and Save the Children USA.
- Facilitated use of several WASH non-food items, available with DPHE stores, to the local NGOs for the distribution to affected population. Similarly agencies have used the bleaching powder available in DPHE stores for disinfecting tube-wells.

Following decisions were taken in second WASH cluster/working group meeting:

- As a matter of priority, WASH cluster partner agencies: WaterAid, Oxfam GB and NGO Forum will assist DPHE Executive Engineers in co-chairing district level emergency WASH coordination meetings in the districts of Satkira, Khulna and Bagerhat respectively. One round of such meeting is planned by 17 June. In addition, Oxfam GB will continue co-chairing divisional level coordination meeting at Khulna with the Superintending Engineer as Co-chair. The notes of these meetings will be circulated widely among cluster partner agencies.
- Agencies will share with the WASH cluster/working group coordinator regarding their plans in carrying out assessment by 10 June 09. It has been requested to all the working-group partner agencies to use WASH rapid assessment tools to help all of us

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to have a common assessment that will be easy to put together. DPHE will share the result of their damage assessment; and their response up to upazilla and union levels in due course that will be circulated among participating agencies.

- The 'who is doing what and where' matrix on WASH will be updated with quantity of response by agencies, at least up to upazilla level, to have clearer gap analysis to design the responses.
- Agencies will share their forth-coming immediate response plans and early-recovery plans with the WASH working group to avoid duplication of efforts and to identify gap areas.
- Based on the assessment results, WASH cluster/working group coordinator will estimate the financial need and available resources to arrive at a gap. If needed, WASH cluster coordinator will discuss with donors to find possibilities of mobilising more resources for emergency/ early-recovery WASH interventions.
- Following the detailed assessment and funding needs, a strategic advisory group will be activated, if needed.
