This may include institutional strengthening in Government, and will also include better linkages between Government, NGOs, private sector and civil society—all of whom have a stake in implementing the PRSP.

Close Government-DPs collaboration (under Government leadership) will be ensured for implementing and monitoring PRSP.
